Dear Reader.

The idea for *The Mother Act* came to me one difficult afternoon in early motherhood when I wanted to walk out on my kids.

I'd become a mother after years of ambivalence. I had few models of women who successfully combined motherhood and an artistic vocation, and I was terrified that becoming a mother would mean losing myself. Once my daughters arrived, I felt invalidated by societal approval of my choice to mother, beleaguered by the disproportionate burden of labor placed on me versus my husband, and silenced by glib assumptions about the most complex experience of my life.

I loved my two daughters (who, I can't emphasize enough, were and are incredible humans). I wanted to give them a nurturing and secure upbringing. But I was a stay-at-home parent alone for weeks at a stretch with a baby and a toddler while my actor husband worked out of town, and my intellectual life, creative dreams, and personal identity felt wholly colonized by the simultaneous under- and over-stimulation of domesticity. In one piercing moment on this particular afternoon, I felt how thoroughly this mothering life had sabotaged everything I'd worked so hard to create and become. I visualized myself walking out the door, boarding a bus headed somewhere far away, and starting over as a solo, unfettered person.

The catch: I could never choose the pain of abandonment for my girls. And that's when the idea landed. I would write a novel in which a mother does act out that escape fantasy—and a daughter lives with the fallout.

From the start, the story was inherently two-sided, an unsolvable dilemma with two irreconcilable perspectives: a woman prioritizes her own thriving; a young girl suffers as a consequence. I wanted to give full voice to them both. I drew on my front-row seat to my husband's profession and made both mother and daughter actors who ultimately use their craft to make sense of their relationship.

I wrote this story with some trepidation about the unspeakable sentiments I was allowing to live on the page. My hope is that in doing so, I've opened a pathway for others, especially women, to feel affirmed and seen—whether they're joyfully child-free, on the fence about parenting, in love with their kids but frustrated by one-note depictions of motherhood, or trying to outrun the long shadow cast by their own mothers. If you resonate with any of that, I hope you'll find yourself reflected, expanded, and, above all, entertained by these pages.

Because did I mention this novel is a romp? Despite its weighty themes, *The Mother Act* is fun, propulsive, even a bit frothy. The characters are entertainers, after all, and what would a novel about actors be without a bit of comedy and drama?



Set against the sparkling backdrop of the New York City theatre world, **THE MOTHER ACT by Heidi Reimer (Dutton; on-sale April 30, 2024)** is an emotionally complex, clever, and deliciously dramatic debut, told in six acts from the alternating points of view of an actress who refused to abandon her career and the daughter she chose to abandon instead.

Sadie Jones, a larger-than-life actress and controversial feminist, catapulted to fame with her scathing one-woman show, *The Mother Act*, all about her one truth: she never wanted to be a mother. No one feels this more deeply than Jude, the daughter Sadie left with her husband when Jude was a toddler. Sadie created her career centered around her maternal rage, while Jude toured with her father's Shakespearian theater company through her childhood, desperate for validation from the mother she barely knew. As the years go on, with only infrequent visits

between the two where they attempt to act as a mother and daughter should, their relationship strains.

Now, two decades later, Jude is a talented actress in her own right, and her fraught relationship with Sadie has come to a very public head. Sadie has invited Jude to the sold-out premiere of her latest play, one that exposes their entire relationship for the public to view and to judge. With years of love, resentment, and misunderstanding laid bare, the questions loom: What are the costs of being a devoted mother *and* a devoted artist, and who gets to decide if the collateral damage is justified?

Heidi Reimer is an editor and novel-writing coach at Sarah Selecky Writing School, and her works have appeared in *The New Quarterly, The M Word, Body & Soul*, and more. **THE MOTHER ACT** was inspired by a particularly challenging day she experienced in early motherhood. As a stay-at-home-mother with a baby and a toddler, with her actor-husband working out of town, Reimer was struck by how this mothering life had extinguished her other creative and intellectual pursuits—and for a single instant, she imagined leaving it all behind. Instead, while making dinner for her children, she took feverish notes, pulling her experiences of her own childhood as the eldest of six kids in a religious community, her knowledge of her actor-husband's career, and the never-ending work of motherhood into a literary masterpiece—one that examines the trials, triumphs, and sacrifices of motherhood; the thin line between self-prioritization and self-centeredness; and how a single action can cause a tumultuous, reverberating avalanche.

For fans of feminist reads with bold takes on motherhood, such as *The School for Good Mothers*, and for readers of books about theatre and acting, such as *Trust Exercise*, **THE MOTHER ACT** is equal parts stylish page-turner and provocative exploration of womanhood from the perspectives of a mother and daughter who want at once very different and very similar things. Incredibly nuanced and brilliantly written, **THE MOTHER ACT** is sure to be a story that lingers in readers' heads long after they finish the final page.
